Backgrounder: B.C. care aides likely to quit, facing stress, aggression and time constraints in the workplace

- This telephone survey was conducted with 807 care aides who are members of the Hospital Employees' Union.
- The survey was carried out between September 18 to 29.
- The survey is considered accurate to within +/- 3.3 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
- It included regions quotas to ensure the results accurately reflect the distribution of members across B.C.
- Winnipeg-based Viewpoints Research conducted the survey on behalf of the HEU.

Key Findings

Half of care aides surveyed say that they do not have enough time to adequately meet the needs of their residents, patients or clients.
